Linguistic servingness and "linguistically inclusive" instruction is an area that might be new to many faculty and is still undertheorized in the literature. In this presentation, we will share recorded interviews of several Regis multilingual learners and use these students' discussion of the challenges they have had accessing the content due to language and strategies that did or could support them. These students' lived experience will be the basis for us to explore evidenced based strategies drawn from the linguistically responsive pedagogy that could be employed to support student learning.
